

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LETTERS FROM CAV 5/7 TROOPERS

MAY DAZE

The day was not unlike the previous nine days I had spent with B Co., 5th BN, 7th Cavalry of the 1st Cavalry Division. The heat was very intense, and we were moving at a rapid pace. I was in the mortar platoon, the weight of my load getting a little easier to bear. One became seasoned quickly in the An Loa Valley.

We had a destination and speed was important. We moved down a steep hill toward a flat area where choppers were to pick us up and transport us to another location.

One man in our platoon passed out from heat exhaustion when we reached the bottom of the hill. We were bruised and battered from the rocks and brush we encountered on the way down.

We boarded choppers and moved on to our next destination. The door gunner on my chopper told us we would be hovering a few feet off the ground when we reached the LZ because the hill was mined.

When my chopper reached the hill, I jumped out with my three mortar rounds, plus my M-16 with M-79 grenade launcher attached (the over/under weapon), personal gear, ammunition, etc. I began to move slowly to the top of the hill. I was very carefully trying to avoid anything that looked as if it could be concealing a mine.

The concussion from the explosion sent me sprawling to the ground. My ears were ringing and I wasn't sure what had happened.

A guy was staggering around holding his head. He was peppered with shrapnel wounds. A couple of drops of his blood hit me in the face. I tried to get him to get down. I was afraid he would step on another mine. Our medic got to him, and I handed "Doc" one of my canteens so he could clean the guy's wounds.

Sgt. Orlando Marcano came over to me. I was bleeding from my left side, but only a small hole was there. It burned a bit. Under the circumstances, I am not sure it warranted the Purple Heart I received.

Medivac picked us up in a few minutes. I sat there and watched a medic try to save the man who had stepped on the mine. He had been only a few feet behind me. He died just a couple of minutes after we were on our way to LZ English.

I returned to the field the next day, rejoining my company in the Central Highlands of South Vietnam.

Who was he? Why him and not me? I often wondered.

That happened on May 18, 1967. Twenty years passed. I visited The Wall in July 1987, still not knowing who died on the chopper that day.

I did eventually learn it was PFC Carl Hallberg from Delayan, WI, who died that day.

At a reunion of the 5th BN, 7th CAV in July, 1998, I laid a yellow rose near his name at **The Wall** in Washington, DC. Farewell, Brother. God keep you. He didn't want me that day in May.

GENERAL GEORGE ARMSTRONG CUSTER

Fellow troopers, I have read many books on George Armstrong Custer and The Battle of The Little Bighorn as part of my research on our battalion. The book titled **TO HELL WITH HONOR** by, Larry Sklenar is one of the best.

The image of the famous "last stand" of the Seventh U.S. Cavalry under General George Armstrong Custer has metamorphosed into myth. We picture the solitary Custer standing upright to the end; his troops formed into groups of wounded and dying men around him.

In this book, Larry Sklenar analyzes and interprets the widely accepted facts underlying the accepted portrayal of Custer's defeat. His perspective, however, is fresh and he offers wholly new conclusions about one of the most enduring mysteries in American history ---- the 1876 Battle of the Little Bighorn.

Sklenar contends that Custer did have a battle plan, one different from any other suggested by scholars thus far. Custer, he argues:

- Had reason to believe that his scheme might succeed with minimum bloodshed
- Made decisions consistent with army regulations and his best instincts as an experienced commander.
- Had subordinates who could not overcome the limits of their personalities in a desperate situation, and
- Made a selfless commitment to save the bulk of his regiment.

Along the way, Sklenar appraises the officers and other men who served in the Seventh, evaluating the survivors' testimony and assessing the intent and motives of each. The movements and decision of these men, the plans and goals of their regimental leader, and the remembrances and testimony of Indian eyewitnesses form the basis for this narrative history of the Seventh's famous fight.

Larry Sklenar retired from the U.S. Defense Department, concentrated six years of research on Custer and the Battle of the Little Bighorn.

Some of you may already know that Peter was diagnosed with malignant melanoma in January of 1989 just after we moved To Middleburg, Virginia. Initial treatment was surgery. We have been blessed since this did not substantially affect our lives for twelve years, other than periodic appointments with an oncologist and a dermatologist. Unfortunately the melanoma has reoccurred. We have looked at the limited options and have decided that Peter will enter a research program for treatment that is being conducted by the National Cancer Institute of the National Institutes of Health. The treatment is designed to boost the patient's immune system

We believe this development cannot wait to be included in an end of the year holiday message. Please continue to treat us as you would without this development. We are continuing to socialize and participate in community and family activities to the extent treatment schedules and progress permit.

Peter's treatment started in May at NCI's facility at Bethesda, Maryland. He was treated on an in-patient basis for about a week.

The weeklong in-patient treatment cycle is being repeated several times after two-week periods at home. While Peter is in Bethesda, Susan stays at a Bethesda hotel.

We strongly believe (and are told by many who have fought cancer) that the thoughts and prayers from others are an important part of any treatment and recovery program. We would appreciate your help.

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TREASURER'S REPORT

I hope that all of you are having a great summer.

I would like to thank all of you for the overwhelming response to our last newsletter. As you know we had very little dues activity since our return from Nashville through March of this year and it caused our treasury to go down considerably. Well, I can't believe the mail the last few weeks.

We received a lot of dues, donations, and some PX sales. I turned over the CD from \$10,000 (which earned us over \$350 in 7 months) to an \$8,000 CD. We were getting bank fees of \$10 for each month because our checking account had fallen below \$2500. This situation is now corrected and we shouldn't be charged any more bank fees.

We are in great financial shape right now.

I also appreciated the many notes that accompanied the checks. Hopefully, from now on, we will have the dues information on the mailing labels and clear up all doubts of how you stand in your dues.

Many of you apologized for not sending in your dues.

First, let me say that no one should apologize for getting behind. The reason we have yearly dues is to cover the cost of the AIRMOBILE. It costs about \$1 to print, label and mail each issue or about \$4 a year.

When we discussed yearly dues at our earlier reunions, we hoped that those who could afford to pay yearly dues keep them up. So, if you see, on the mailing label, that you are one or more years behind in your dues, don't worry.

If you send in a check, just let me know what years you want your dues applied to. It doesn't have to be for back dues unless you want it done that way.

One letter that I really enjoyed stated, "because of an article in the newsletter", he had been encouraged to file a VA claim and now with the extra money coming in could catch up on his dues.

We hope the newsletter helps by

giving information and news you might find useful. This was a case where it did. Also, it is a way to keep in touch and keeps you posted about the reunions.

If you haven't come to a reunion, we hope that you do. It really does help to know that there are those who went through many of the same things you did.

You are not alone.

On another note, I have been cleaning up the database file. Over the years we have had numerous people handle the database. They did a great job adding names and making the many changes that come in each day, however, we all make mistakes.

There are over 4,000 names in our database with over 1400 active addresses so it's easy to make mistakes.

We had duplicate names, missing information, addresses that needed correcting, changed email addresses, dues info – you name it.

I make corrections as I find them and when directed by you.

As I type this article, I have a pile of letters in front of me, some telling me to make corrections to their address, or city, or something. I double-check your name, address, and any information I get from your letters and return addresses.

Don't be ashamed to let me know if you see a mistake. I appreciate the letters correcting the mistakes. So, if you see any mistakes, let me know. I don't like my name misspelled and neither should you.

If you see a mistake on your dues, let me know immediately. I had a couple of people who corrected me on their dues.

You don't need to take the trouble of finding a cancelled check. I BE-LIEVE YOU. As I'm also doing the Treasury Report, I can go back and double check all checks sent to me since the last reunion.

However, I ask one thing. If you sent in a check to me and your dues were not updated, look at the date of my Treasury Report. You will see that I usually take the last bank statement

before we come out with the newsletter. In the last newsletter, that statement was at the end of March.

By the time we got all the articles together, the newsletter edited, printed, labeled and mailed, and you finally received it, a month had gone by. So, anyone sending in dues after the end of March would not see a change on how far they have "paid up" until the next newsletter.

I hope that clears any misunderstanding between sending in your dues and when you see a change on the mailing label.

Finally, it's still good hearing from you for whatever reason, even if you have a complaint.

General Wickham has kindly agreed that we could share his accounts of the battle with our Cav 5/7 troopers and their families.


The account an its details are rather lengthy so they have been captured in a separate article titled the "Battle at LZ Colt" and published on the Cav 5/7 web site.
