

Army Records? How to Get the Copies You Need!

Do you want or need a copy of your DD214, medical records, 201 file, or a complete copy of all your military records? The National Personnel Record Center located in St. Louis, MO. is the place you need to write to: NPRC MPR, 9700 Page Boulevard, St. Louis, MO 63132.

When you were completely discharged from your military service your record was sent there for storage. *They are waiting for you to write and request a copy.* There is a large backlog of requests so it could take some time.

When you request copies of your records also ask for copies of your orders (Purple Heart, Bronze Star, Silver Star, Army Commendation Medal, CIB, Travel orders, anything with other 5/7 Cav names on it. (Almost all orders were written with other names and information on them.) WE CAN'T FIND YOUR BUDDIES IF WE DON'T KNOW THEIR NAMES.

To request a copy of your military records fill out a SF180 and mail it to the record center. Your records will be mailed to you direct from the record center. I can't tell you how long it will take, because it depends on what you request and where your records are. Medal of Honor

A display honoring 5th Battalion, 7th Cavalry troopers who were awarded the Congressional **Medal of Honor** for extraordinary acts of bravery while serving in the Republic of Viet Nam from 1966 to 1971 is planned for presentation during Reunion V. Four of our troopers earned the distinction of wearing this prestigious medal. Recipients are Private First Class Lewis Albanese from Company B (1/12/66); Sergeant (then PFC) William D. Port from Company C (1/12/68); Captain (then 1st Lt) James M. Sprayberry from Company D (25/4/68); and Specialist Fourth Class Hector Santiago-Colon (28/6/68).

The **Medal of Honor** awarded for "conspicuous gallantry and intrepidity at the risk of life, above and beyond the call of duty, in action involving actual conflict with an opposing armed force", was born of conflict and steeped in controversy during its early years. It finally emerged, along with Great Britain's Victoria Cross and France's Legion of Honor, as one of the premier awards for bravery in the world.

The medal was created in 1862 during the Civil War as a re ward for gallantry in action and other soldier-like qualities. However, the reference to other qualities led to many awards for actions which would seem less than heroic. This included presentation of the medal to 864 members of the 27th Maine Volunteer Infantry for merely reenlisting. This number represented the entire membership of the Infantry unit.

The inconsistencies were apparently resolved in the early 20th Century when 910 names were removed from the lists (including those of the 27th Maine). At the same time, the statutes which govern the award of the medal were revised to reflect the present day criteria of "gallantry and intrepidity at the risk of his/her life above and beyond the call of duty".

The Army **Medal of Honor** was redesigned in 1904 and patented by the War Department. The medal, a five-pointed golden star lays over a green

Reunion Banquet Address

Major General (Retired) Robert S. Frix has accepted the invitation to deliver the traditional banquet address on the evening of July 7 at our Nashville reunion.

MG Frix is one of our own. As a Major, commencing in July, 1968 he spent seven months as the S-3 of the 5th Battalion, 7th Cavalry and saw some of its toughest fighting. He retired form the Army in 1995 and is now President of Dyncorp Tri-Cities in Richland, Washington. He is presently in charge of the Site Infrastructure which supports the Department of Energy's cleanup of the Hanford Works Nuclear Site (Manhattan Project) near Richland, WA.

We had previously announced that General Barry McCaffrey, the Director of the United States Office of National Drug Control Policy, would be our banquet speaker. As Captain McCaffrey he had commanded a company in the 2d Bn, 7th Cav, in 1968. In inviting him I realized that, given the critical and demanding nature of his current responsibilities, his official duties could possibly interfere with our plan. Such was our understanding with him when General McCaffrey accepted the invitation.

That is exactly what has happened. One of the important not-for-profit anti-drug organizations, D.A.R.E, has claimed General McCaffrey as their banquet speaker that same evening. We both tried to work it out, but neither his schedule nor ours could be adjusted.

We are most fortunate that Bob Frix was able to change his schedule, as originally it had precluded his attending Reunion V. I know you will enjoy

being with him and listening to his message.

Regimental Tie

Troopers, we've been able to arrange for a special order of 7th Cavalry Regimental ties that come in a tartan design unique to the 7th Cavalry. The Regimental Pipe and Drum Band, organized by SSG Robert J. Scroggie in late 1954 at camp Haugen, Japan designed the tartan pattern. The tartan colors are dark blue and yellow to represent the U.S. Cavalry, light blue to signify the present day infantry role in the cavalry, red for action and white for honor. The 7th Cavalry Regiment is the only American Unit that has a registered tartan.

Total cost is \$25.00 per tie. The price includes shipping and handling plus a small profit for the association.

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Reunion V: Your Guide to Events in Nashville

Reunion V is only one month away. There are over 150 members and 100 guests registered. Reunion V will be Sunday July 2, through Saturday July 8, 2000. It is being held at the Airport Marriott in Nashville, TN.

It is important that you make your reservations at the hotel early. The association rate will only be good until June 2, 2000. If you register after that date you will have to pay the full room price. The phone number to register is:

1-800-770-0555

There is free shuttle service from the airport to the hotel. It runs every 20 minutes: 10 minutes to the hour, ten minutes after and 30 minutes after.

The Reunion V major events will be Thursday, Friday and Saturday July 6, 7 and 8. If you can only make a small part of the reunion these are the dates that you should try to attend.

The main event is the Friday night banquet. The other event attended by nearly everyone is the Saturday morning Memorial service. Our plans are to have the service at one of the Tennessee State Capital memorials downtown.

Thursday night we are planning a bus trip to downtown Nashville to take in some of the nightlife.

Thursday and Friday mornings are when we have our business meetings and election of officers.

The last event of the reunion will be our Saturday evening country style barb-que outside in a picnic area behind the hotel. This is a time to really relax and say good-by until the next reunion.

The first part of the week is a time to get together, see the sights and relax. We will open registration on Sunday afternoon the 2^{nd} of July.

Monday will be the first day that things will start to happen. Each day we will open a hospitality suite from around 0800 until it closes sometime around 2400.

We will have coffee, donuts and orange juice for breakfast; sandwiches and chips for lunch; and a full range of beverages. It will be an open bar with donations accepted to help defray the cost.

The registration office and information center will be open each day from around 08:00 until around 2000 in the evening. The memorabilia room will be open about the same hours.

There will also be a PX open early in the week. We are looking to have a few new items in the PX to include a nice polo shirt with the Garry Owen crest.

Sunday through Wednesday you will be on your own.

On Monday night we will offer an opportunity to take a ride on the Cumberland River on a paddle wheeler showboat named the General Jackson. It takes a one-hour trip down the Cumberland River to downtown Nashville, turns around and comes back up the river. During the ride you will enjoy dinner and a floorshow. Each ticket will run \$49.50 and includes transportation to the General Jackson from the Hotel.

Tuesday is the 4th of July. We are recommending a trip downtown for concerts on the river, shopping and fireworks.

On Wednesday night we will have an icebreaker in the hospitality room where we will have free pizza. We plan to have it early because a number of me mbers have asked for one night as a ladies night out and this will be on Wednesday night. On this evening the ladies will pick the place to go. It will be their night with no talk of the battalion, Vietnam, etc.

We will also have a golf tournament on Wednesday. These plans are all still in the development stages but look pretty promising.

The hotel has a health spa, indoor & outdoor swimming pools, lighted tennis courts, nice restaurant and an out of the way casual bar. It is close to the airport and has free parking. It is only fifteen minutes from downtown Nashville.

On the down side, Nashville does not have a good mass transit system. For those of you that want to get out during the day and see some of the sights a car will be an advantage. As in the past

there are many folks who bring cars and love to share the ride from place to place with others.

We would like to try a new approach for Reunion V and are asking for volunteers to help for short periods of time during the reunion. That way we can share the load and not kill a few people.

The five general areas for volunteer help are: Registration and Information; Hospitality; Transportation and Logistics; Banquets and Meetings; and PX. There will be a manager for each group and then volunteers to help in each group on a shift basis. Each shift will be around four hours.

There is a place on the registration slip to indicate whether or not you would be willing to help and in what area. Please indicate on the form if you would like to help out.

The last thing is registration. We have had to raise the registration fee to \$60 for this reunion. Your fee will pay administrative and overhead cost, the Friday night banquet, and Saturday night Bar-B-Que. If you or any of your quests will be unable to attend the dinners, the administrative Registration fee is \$10 per person.

Please call and make your reservations at the hotel as soon as you can. Also send in your registration form as soon as you can. Be sure and complete as much information on the form as you can. The more information we have the better we can plan and prepare for the reunion.

I do not need your registration money right away if you would prefer to pay later. What we need now is your intention to attend and the information you can provide for planning.

We certainly look forward to having you join us in Nashville for Reunion V. See you next month!

The back of the medal is inscribed, "The Congress to", with a place for the recipient's name. The medal hangs from a bar inscribed "Valor", which is held by an American Eagle with laurel leaves (peace) in its right claw and arrows (war) in its left. The eagle is fastened by a hook to a light blue silk pad embroidered with 13 stars. The medal is traditionally presented by the President of the United States in the name of Congress.

The display recognizing our **Medal of Honor** winners will be located in the 5th Battalion, 7th Cavalry Memorabilia Room in the Marriott Hotel throughout the Reunion. The display will have photos of the four recipients who earned the medal and copies of the individual citations describing their acts of valor.
