<u>Unit Tribute.</u> I am proud to report that our 5/7 Cavalry Unit Tribute marker was added to the Path of Remembrance leading up to the National Museum of the United States Army at Fort Belvoir, VA. The marker was erected on November 9, just in time for Veterans Day! This marker is the first to recognize the 7th Cavalry Regiment, and of course 5/7 Cav led the way! This project was a labor of love and a special mission that Howard Prince gave me prior to his passing, and I believe it's a fitting legacy to his service in 5/7 Cavalry. Thank you to each of you that helped us raise the money to cover the cost. You will find our tribute marker on panel 4 when you visit the museum.

<u>Did you know?</u> George Armstrong Custer was not the commander of the 7th Cavalry when he met his demise at Little Big Horn. True, he was the tactical leader of the regiment as it set off on the Sioux Campaign of 1876 and at the pivotal battle forever associated with him, but he was not the regimental commander. That would be one Colonel Samuel Sturgis, a Civil War former general who it is reported was found drunk while his soldiers attacked Marye's Heights at the 1862 Battle of Fredericksburg. Sturgis was also embarrassed at the Battle of Brice's Crossroads by a guy named Forrest. While Custer led the regiment in the field, Sturgis spent 1876 on administrative duty in St. Louis, MO. Sadly, his son 2LT James Sturgis, was killed on Custer Hill, his body never positively identified.

Please keep the families of Larry Nunez and Hank Thomas in your prayers, as well as so many of our brothers who are currently struggling with health issues.

5/7 Squadron Update

WARPAINT Troopers - Past, Present, and Future!
The focus of the Squadron over the past few weeks has been Soldier risk mitigation and long weekend closeout for Thanksgiving, Expert Soldier Badge pre-requisite testing, and Marne Week preparation and execution. In true Squadron fashion, many of our leaders hosted Troopers at their residences for Thanksgiving and others dropped off food to the

barracks to help Troopers feel more at home during the holiday period.

As we continue to train fit, disciplined, and cohesive teams the Squadron conducted an expert physical fitness assessment for 51x Expert Badge candidates. Each candidate passed the tests and moved to the diagnostic 12 mile ruck march and M4 rifle qualification in the next two weeks prior to winter break.

Finally, the Squadron is fielding 100% of our allotted Marne Week team slots and looks to contribute to the Raider BDE Marne Week Victory that is sure to come! Raiders First!

Hero of the Week:

WARPAINT's Heroes of the Week are 2LT Drew Litynski and SSG John Patterson. These two leaders have planned, rehearsed, and resourced Marne Week's Winterfest. They've coordinated with brigade, division, and installation since September and have attended multiple meetings with senior leaders across Fort Stewart. I am incredibly impressed with the maturity and attention to detail these junior leaders have demonstrated throughout the planning process and the way they have represented the Squadron and Raider BDE

Squadron Highlights:

On 21NOV22, the Squadron held their annual Turkey Bowl. Darkhorse Troop was denied a third consecutive championship by Apache Troop, who won the coveted Turkey Trophy with a phenomenal late quarter drive.

We also had SGT(R) Jack Thomas attend the Turkey Bowl. Jack is a Vietnam Veteran who served in 5-7 CAV from '69-70 and took part in the Vietnam War's Cambodian Incursion that attempted to sever North Vietnamese supply lines along the Ho Chi Min Trail. Jack spoke to the squadron about the importance of staying connected with your buddies and invited each Soldier to join the 5-7 CAV Association.

On 28NOV, we began Marne Week 2022. The Squadron began Marne Week preparations in late October and consistently practiced throughout November. Warpaint is postured to maximize points in each sport and help win Marne Week for the Brigade.

Training Highlights: Bradley New Equipment Training; preparatory training for the Expert Infantryman Badge, Expert Soldier Badge, and the Expert Field Medic Badge; Physical Security Inspections, leader professional development on the Squadron Maintenance SOP, Marne Week Sport preparation, Winterfest preparation, a Commander & 1SG course and simulation gunnery training.

Apache Troop conducted land navigation training, vehicle maintenance, property inventories, and cleared their excess equipment.

Blackfoot Troop conducted M4 rifle training, land navigation classes and sent soldiers to complete their Expert Medical Badge pre-requisites.

Comanche Troop conducted Team situational training exercises, thereby increasing squad lethality and mitigating atrophy in dismounted tactical maneuver. Darkhorse Troop conducted long weekend close out activities and assessed Soldier well-being, specifically their high and medium risk population. Darkhorse conducted an Army Community Services financial readiness class that focused on budgeting and holiday expenditures, investing, and saving.

Diesel Troop (Modernization) conducted dining facility operations, vehicle and shop maintenance, fuel and water support, and distribution operations. They also participated in Bradley new equipment training. Horseman Troop conducted IV and blood transfusion didactic training with the 160th SOAR. The troop had also supervised, graded, and trained for Expert Field Medic Badge events.

Jack Thomas' Visit to 5/7 Squadron

A little about me. I was born into a military family, my dad being a career NCO in the Army. I enlisted in 1968, not into the Infantry, but the Signal Corps. That didn't exactly go to plan, quickly realizing that electronics was not for me. The Army had a need and I soon found myself in Tiger Land, Ft. Polk. From there it was off to Ft. Benning for the NCO course and in September of 1969 I found myself in Sunny Southeast Asia, and my new home with Bravo Company, 5th Bn, 7th Cav. Serving under no less than four Battalion Commanders, three Company Commanders, and four platoon leaders during my tour. Capt. Mullineaux, and Lt 's Cohn, Wood and Bauer did their best to see that I got home in one piece. Like you, I have fond memories of some of those who lead us.

Upon DEROS I found myself getting married to the love of my life, Emilie, who has stood by my side thru all these years. I have two wonderful sons, one who is a Persian Gulf Marine veteran, and two equally wonderful grandchildren. I finished up my military time at Ft. Dix, with the help of a Staff Sargent at the replacement company who had a sense of humor. I was assigned as a cell block NCO at the stockade, very different from the jungles where I has spent the last year.

In the mid 80's I became a life member of Vietnam Veterans of America, ultimately at the Chapter, State and National levels and served on many National committees within the organization. I returned to Vietnam in 1998 with their Veterans Imitative program. I am also a life member of the DAV and currently serve as Jr. Vice Commander of my post and Chapter service officer. I had a career in the body and fender business, with heavy trucks. and retired in 2014. I have been involved with 5/7 since 2004. Hobbies include home repair, performance automobiles and at 74 I still play with trains.

I doubt there is anyone left to find who wants to be found, but my soap box is always ready to talk to anyone about the benefits of belonging to such a fine organization, and the camaraderie I have found since becoming a part of it. This has not been a "those who served only" group but one which is also welcoming of the spouse/significant other into the fold as well. Where would many of us be without that companion who shared the ups and downs of our service and helped us thru troubling times. Those partners are as big a support group as our brothers are and many encourage our participation in this organization.

The big job now is to pass along our legacy and the commitment to the younger generation of 5/7 Veterans, for some day this will be their organization. With that being said.....

After our gathering on Veterans Day in Washington D.C., Emilie and I ventured a bit farther south to visit our son in Florida who had just weathered hurricane lan. Being in the neighborhood, I thought it might be a good Idea to try and visit the current 5/7, while they are home, at Ft. Stewart Georgia.

With assistance from Cliff Wheeler, I was put me in touch with the current Squadron Commander, LTC. Andrew Marsh who was carbon copied on Cliff 's reply to me. LTC Marsh responded before I even had a chance to write a request, with an invitation to visit.
